

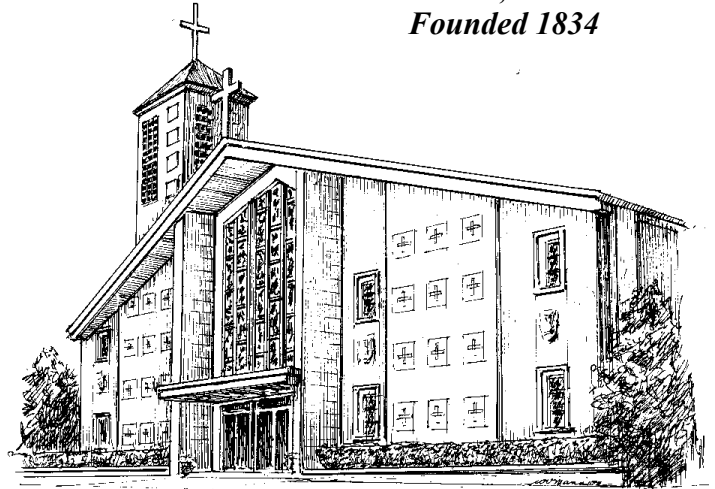

WORLD MISSION SUNDAY

"CELEBRATE THE HOPE THAT SAVES"

"World Mission Sunday," organized by the Propagation of the Faith, is a day set aside for Catholics worldwide to recommit themselves to the Church's missionary activity through prayer and sacrifice. As described by Pope John Paul II, World Mission Sunday is "an important day in the life of the Church because it teaches how to give as an offering made to God in the Eucharistic celebration and for all the missions of the world." Every year the needs of the Catholic Church in the missions grow as new dioceses are formed, new seminarians are opened, as areas devastated by war or natural disasters are rebuilt and as other areas, long suppressed, are opening up to hear the Gospel of Christ preached by missionaries around the globe.

A NEW TRANSLATION (part 2)

On the first Sunday of Advent of this year, November 27th to be exact, we will begin the Church's liturgical year with a new translation of some of the prayers of the Eucharistic Liturgy. The central mystery of the Liturgy is not changing, but some word changes in the way it is celebrated. The structure of the prayers basically remains the same, but the new translation becomes more faithful to the original Latin of the Roman Missal. For example, when the priest says "The Lord be with you" the people will now respond "And with your spirit."

"...the most fundamental building block of a just social order is respect for human life and until men and women individually and collectively make a profound commitment to the value and dignity of all human life, we will never find true peace, justice and reconciliation..." (Jesuit Conference Board)

"CATHOLICS COMING HOME"

We remind parishioners of their responsibility of supporting those now serving in the Ministry entitled CATHOLICS COMING HOME. The members are hoping that those parishioners who have been faithful to living out our Catholic Faith will be instrumental in encouraging others who have drifted from the practice of the Faith to "return home" to the Table of the Lord's Supper. To help parishioners in this process, there is a "blue card" now available at the doors of the church that might be given to one who is looking for "answers to questions."

PRAYING FOR THE DEAD

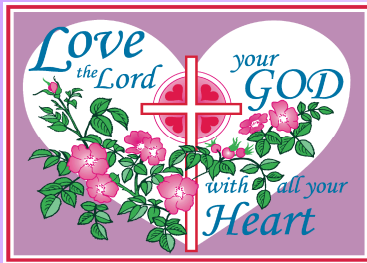

FIVE STEPS TO SAFER ENVIRONMENT

The Diocese of Pittsburgh mandates that all people who work with children and youth in our parishes and schools must undergo child abuse prevention training through the VIRTUS program. The training details five steps to prevent child sexual abuse: Know the warning signs of an inappropriate relationship with a child.

1. Know the warning signs!
2. Control access to children by carefully selecting the adults who work with children and youth.
3. Monitor all programs for the safety of children and youth.
4. Be aware of and sensitive to what is going on in the lives of children.
5. Communicate concerns to the appropriate person in authority.

Scripture Reading: Luke 9: 11-17

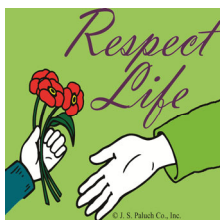
Reflection from Pope Benedict XVI, December 10, 2008:

Pastoral Impressions for World Mission Sunday

Sixty years ago, Archbishop Fulton Sheen created the World Mission Rosary. Each decade of the rosary is a different color and each color represents a different area of the world where **missionaries** continue to share the Good News of Jesus. **Yellow** is for the morning light of those who live in the mid- and Far East. **Blue** is for those who live on islands surrounded by the oceans. **Green** represents those who live in the jungles, grasslands, and forests of Africa. **White** represents the peoples of Europe and our Holy Father, shepherd of the Church. **Red** represents **the fire of faith** that brought the first missionaries to the Americas. Msgr. Sheen said that “one who prays the World Mission Rosary gives the world a big, prayerful hug.” What a great intention with each decade to pray on this Mission Sunday, or any day.

Last week gave me a greater appreciation for **the fire of faith** that brought the first Jesuit missionaries to Saint Clement Island and the shores of southern Maryland. Having gone on pilgrimage there, I learned of Father Andrew White who arrived in 1634, ministered to the 150 Catholic and Protestant pilgrims who came on the two ships, the Ark and the Dove, and befriended the native Americans. As more settlers arrived and factions arose in the colonies, Catholics were targets of persecution. The priests risked their lives to celebrate the Sacraments, but did so with great courage. We visited the oldest Catholic Church, founded in 1640, and still serving the community of Leonardtown, Maryland, pausing in awe as we learned from the young pastor that many Jesuits are buried in the churchyard where only one large stone has engraved a list of names of those who served there. This glimpse into the past work of missionaries gives deeper appreciation for all the missionaries, over the centuries down to our very times, who sacrificed to carry on the Good News and fierce Love of our God. This observance of World Mission Sunday is reminder that we too, as Baptized into Christ Jesus, are to carry His love to those with whom we live, work, and serve. Let that love extend in faith through prayer for those in the yellow, blue, green, white, and red areas of the world. Give the world YOUR hug!
